

Camp Safety Training: Facilitator's Guide Aquatic Safety in Natural Bodies of Water

Discussion Questions

- · What is our responsibility when we take our campers to the waterfront?
- What challenges do we face at our waterfront?
- What information should we share with our lifeguards before our campers get in the water?

Activity #1

Name of activity: Give Me Five

Length of activity: 10 minutes

By simply brainstorming the takeaways from the Aquatic Safety in Natural Bodies of Water training together, you can both encourage reflection and discussion, and also get a sense of staff learning styles and retention. This will give you a sense of what learning will need to be reinforced.

Objectives:

- 1. Staff will be able to communicate what active engagement does and does not look like at the waterfront.
- 2. Staff will be able to offer specific strategies for implementing active engagement at the waterfront.

Materials:

Markers, sticky note pads and large chart paper or white board located in front of group.

Instructions:

- 1. Break into small groups. Write five takeaways together (five minutes) one on each sticky note.
- 2. The facilitator can prompt the groups by asking what they remember, what specific actions they would now take differently, and what they think are the most important lessons. It's a good idea to also ask how the role of lifeguard and camp counselor, or staff member, are different.
- 3. Each group shares sticky notes with the whole group. Write or have someone scribe on sticky notes what the group comes up with.



Activity #2

Name of activity: PFD Blindfold

Length of activity: 20 minutes

It's important that all campers wear a PFD when they are outside of the designated swimming area in a natural body of water. This activity will reinforce the importance of a PFD properly fitting a camper, as well as teaching your staff how to fit a PFD and be sure it's secure.

Objectives:

- 1. Staff will be able to properly fit a PFD.
- 2. Staff will have an increased sense of trust and community among themselves.

Materials:

- Blindfolds
- Three or four assorted sizes of PFDs per group

Instructions:

- 1. Bring a group of staff down to the waterfront. This can also be done in small groups anywhere.
- 2. Have the group form a circle.
- 3. Pick two participants to be blindfolded, or ask them to keep their eyes closed. One participant will be #1 and the other, #2.
- 4. Once they are blindfolded, place the PFDs in the middle of the circle.
- 5. Have the rest of the group verbally guide the blindfolded participants to the PFDs, and have participant #1 select the right sized PFD and place it on participant #2 correctly. Both participants cannot see or talk.
- 6. After the whole group decides they have completed the task successfully, both participants can take off their blindfolds and debrief:
 - If you were part of the larger group, what was that like?
 - If you were blindfolded, what was that like?
 - How do you select and secure the right sized PFD?



Activity #3

Name of activity: I Say Buddy, You Say Check

Length of activity: 20-30 minutes

Buddy checks will ensure that all of your campers are present, and that all of your campers are safe. Before your staff can lead a successful buddy check, it's helpful for them to understand the different challenges they may face. This activity is designed to be practice for your staff.

Objectives:

- 1. Staff will be able to lead a successful buddy check.
- 2. Staff will be able to plan for the different challenges that may occur during a buddy check.

Instructions:

- 1. Take staff to the waterfront and lead them through what a successful buddy check looks like.
- 2. Assign each staff member a swim buddy.
- 3. Have the group guess how long it will take to fully complete the buddy check when called (for example: 48 seconds).
- 4. Have the staff swim or play games at the water front for a few minutes. Then randomly call a buddy check.
- 5. Time the buddy check to see how long it actually took to complete.
- 6. Challenge the group to beat that time.
- 7. Repeat as many times as you would like.
- 8. End with a debrief:
 - How easy is the buddy check?
 - What challenges can you see in quickly accounting for all campers?
 - How can we plan for those challenges?
 - Why is it important to do this in a timely and efficient manner?
